To The Black Brothers and Sisters:

We are one of the first graduating classes in a time when more black students are enrolled in colleges, than any other time, in the history of America. A large part of this is due to new college programs around the country for "disadvantaged minorities". These programs are the result of a period of demonstrations on the part of black people to show our plight. A period of demonstrations that started out in a phase of marches, and ended in a phase of riots. In essence, we can say that we are here, and these programs exist, because at one time a lot of brothers and sisters got out in the streets and showed their anger. Yet, the vast majority of these brothers and sisters are not here, in college benefitting from their actions. Instead we are here, and we must always remember that we owe something to the brothers and sisters we left behind.

As in all things, the white society would not have "granted" us degrees unless it was to its advantage. They will use us to their advantage by making us the new "Black Elite", and giving us an even bigger share of the "American Pie". They will give us high paying jobs in their corporations, and our own suburbs to live in. They will offer us status and recognition. They know that some of us will go back to our ghettos and take over positions of leadership; positions of leadership, but not of power. We will just be a part of the powerless white collar labor force. And the "power elite", that 3%-5% of Americans who control 60% of its wealth, will still control our communities, only this time through our new black faces. Wealth is synonymous with power in America, and black people will always be powerless until we control vital industries and corporations. Unfortunately, black capitalism is a myth, and will always be until we can build cars cheaper than General Motors. We must be aware of this, and much more.

We must realize that the goal of black people should not be to become an equal part of the "American dream". American society is based on capitalism, socially, politically, and economically, and as a race we will never succeed if we think in a capitalistic mode. American society is based on disunity, and indi-

vidual competition. To succeed in such a system, one must be primarily concerned with one's own status, and not that of the group. Individual competition will destroy any mass movement. Notice I said "individual competition", not "individualism". Every person has a right to their own desires, and beliefs, but actions that are done to acquire personal status and recognition, and not to benefit the whole, are detrimental to our struggle for liberation.

Whether we wish to accept it or not, we are the new potential black elite, and we will be treated as such by the whites, and our own people. Both groups will expect us to accept positions of leadership, and we must prepare ourselves for this. We must open our minds, and learn of social dynamics. We must begin to see how this society and other societies function, and the relationships between them. We must begin to appreciate the beauty of human interaction, and study its structure.

I am not trying to tell you what individual role you must play in the struggle. That choice is yours, and yours alone. But I feel that all of us must gain basic insight into the problems facing us, and others. We must realize that the black struggle is also part of an even greater struggle around the world. We must realize that understanding the struggles in Chile, South Africa, Vietnam, and even Ireland, will help us to better understand our own struggle here. The questions of pollution, women's rights, gay rights, Puerto Rican rights, etc.; will all eventually have an effect on us, and we should be basically aware of them. Above all, we must remember that we are black people first, but people just the same, and any problems on this earth are also our problems.

I cannot promise you the things this society will give you if you conform, or allow yourself to be brought out. I cannot promise you clothes, cars, houses, status or recognition. I can't even promise you that your picture will appear in "Ebony". the first "gay liberation" march
in the history of Albany.
So naturally torch '72
has the first "gay" section
in the history of the yearbook.
Since no one on the staff would
admit to having first-hand knowledge,
we decided to interview
Lauren Simone,
a gay guy on campus.





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TORCH: I guess we'll begin with the question of the worse aspects of "gay" life.

LAUREN: Well, if you're not "liberated", that is if you worry about people finding out, the worst part is hiding it . . . It's hard for "straights" to imagine having to hide something like being gay . . . You're on your guard 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, from everybody; your closest friends, your family, your parents . . . everybody. You watch everything you say and do, afraid that you'll drop a clue about yourself . . . The pressure is unbelievable, and unless you find some way to relieve it, you'll probably crack-up. If you are "liberated", the worst part is convincing yourself of your liberation each morning. You have to shut-out society's constant brain-washing, telling you that you're no-good, and "un-natural" . . . a freak . . . It's one thing to admit that you're gay by marching in a parade with 7,000 other gays. It's another to ride home alone, in a crowded subway car, with a "gay is good" button . . . Know what I mean?



TORCH: I see your point. Why do you think you're gay?

LAUREN: How the hell should I know? Why do you think you're straight? ... I don't believe in all that "Freudian" nonsense ... You know, aggressive mother, senile father ...

TORCH: Submissive father.

LAUREN: I know, I was "trying" to be funny ... Where was I? ... Oh yeah ... I believe that sexual attraction is a conditioned response. In other words I believe a person is taught by society whom to be sexually attracted to ... Society starts to indoctrinate them the moment they are born ... You know, blue for boys, and pink for girls ... yellow if you're hermaphroditic ... As the child grows up it becomes obvious to them that a person should only be attracted to the opposite sex. Everything around them tells them this; T.V., movies, magazines, billboards, their friends, their family ... everything. Of course it's not said directly, it's said indirectly ... Always a guy and girl being happy and in love ... Any other forms of love are un-natural, abnormal, or non-existent.

GAY ACTIVISTS ALLIANCE



TORCH: Well if society is so "efficient", what went wrong with your conditioning?

LAUREN: I don't know exactly. Maybe I didn't see enough T.V. commercials . . . maybe I had a traumatic experience with a girl when I was a child . . . I don't know and I don't care. You see a gay person is placed at a disadvantage when he is asked to justify himself. No one bothers to find out if a straight person is straight because in their childhood, they had a traumatic experience when their mother found them performing fellatio on the kid next door. The important thing is that I'm gay and I enjoy being gay. I can function in this society just as well as a straight person can, and my way of living is just as valid as theirs. If they find it disgusting, tough shit, as long as I'm treated equally by the society.

TORCH: What do you think of girls?

LAUREN: I don't.



TORCH: Do you see an advantage to being gay?

LAUREN: Uh, huh. Ideally, and I say "ideally" because in most cases this isn't the way it is. Gays have the same hang-ups as straights besides their own special ones . . . Ideally, being gay forces you to see the world from a different perspective . . . a more objective one. Since you are at odds with society you see its flaws more clearly, and you should be able to identify with other oppressed minority groups . . . For example, years ago Whites found it hard to understand the concept of "institutional racism" in our society. A white gay person could understand faster because he could see how "institutional sexism" affects him. Every aspect of society . . . T.V., movies, tax laws, marriage laws, public education, social services—

TORCH: Social services?

LAUREN: Yeah, like public mental health clinics, public marriage counselors, etc. All these things indoctrinate a person into thinking that mental and physical love is only proper between opposite sexes. Nowhere in this society is gay life given support. The same way years ago the lives of black people weren't supported by this society. They were invisible people . . . Now imagine how this would affect a 13 year old, who is gay. Everywhere he turns, everywhere! . . . he is told that he is a disgusting, abnormal, un-natural freak! It's a wonder the kid doesn't commit suicide.

TORCH: It's that bad, huh?

LAUREN: Sweetheart, it's worse . . . and then the damn straights wonder why so many gay people have hang-ups . . . Hell it's a miracle they're still alive!

TORCH: Are all the problems of gay life caused by the society? Lets say tomorrow society was to completely accept homosexuality, would gay life then be perfect?

LAUREN: Nope . . . the problem is bigger than that. I mean if society was to offer the gays a fair share of the "social pie", eventually we would realize that the pie was shitty from the beginning. The straights themselves are starting to realize that their society leaves much to be desired. Isn't that what the whole counter-culture movement is about? . . . Many gays try to use the script of straight society, but with an all male cast. It doesn't work. The play itself is lousy, regardless of who performs it. There is more to love than not having to say you're sorry, there doesn't have to be role playing for a love relationship to exist. A person is not either masculine, dominating, and competitive (i.e. man) or feminine, submissive, and good-natured (i.e. woman), happiness is just more than one man, one wife, one

house, two kids, two cars and one sheep dog . . . All of these things the straights are now realizing are wrong with their society. If it can't work for the people who built the damn thing, how the hell will it work for us?

TORCH: I assume then that you are against gays getting legally married?

LAUREN: No, I'm not, if it's done for political reasons. In other words, I'm in favor of gays demanding the right to be legally married as a means of forcing the society to confront the gay issue, and examine it's own institution of marriage. However the moment we get that right I say drop it . . . fast! Using the Blacks again as an example, we fought for years to be admitted into restaurants that we ordinarily wouldn't be caught dead in. It wasn't that we wanted the crummy food, it was the principle of the thing. When we got that right we still didn't go to those restaurants, but we knew we could if we wanted to.



TORCH: In recent times, lesbians have been breaking away from gay organizations to set up their own. Won't this weaken the gay movement, because of too many fractions?

LAUREN: No, not really . . . Lesbians have to fight against gay oppression and women's oppression, in this society. Gay males maybe gay, but they are considered by the society to be men, and many of them have socially instilled male-chauvinistic ideas. The lesbians realize this, and see it in their behavior. At first splinter groups weaken the whole, but they separate to become individually stronger. When they get themselves "together" they will rejoin, and be much stronger than before.



TORCH: I guess I'll wrap up the interview by asking you this: You have spoken of the black issue a number of times, which is understandable because you are black. First, is it harder to be black and gay, second is there anything you wish to say about the gay and black movements, and third, do blacks accept black gays, faster than whites accept white gays?

LAUREN: (SMILING) Are you sure that's all? First, it's definitely harder to be black and gay. Whites don't like you 'cause you're black, blacks don't like you 'cause you're gay, and sometimes gays don't like you 'cause you're black, or white. (It's a good thing I'm madly in love with myself). With blacks things may get worse because now they are trying to "recapture" their "lost manhood". They're making the mistake of thinking that "manhood" and "masculinity" are synonymous. Second question . . . I do believe that the women's lib, gay lib, and counter-culture people should study the history of the black movement, since oppressed groups fighting against the same oppressor tend to go through the same stages . . . I believe that all liberation groups should at least "keep in touch" since they are fighting a common enemy. As for blacks accepting it faster . . . I don't know . . . I use to think so, but now I'm not sure. It depends on a lot of things, the particular straights and the particular gays involved. Another factor is the difference between "acceptance" and "tolerance". Black or white, it's one thing to socialize with gay people, but what if that same gay person wanted to head an organization that you belonged to . . . Huey P. Newton publicly endorsed the gay lib, and women's movements. I wonder how he, and the rank and file panthers, would react if an obvious gay, or a woman wanted to lead the party. The same is true for S.D.S. and General Motors.



TORCH: Well, I guess that's it. Any comment you wish to add?

LAUREN: No . . . just one question, off the record.

TORCH: O.K. The tape is off. What's your question?

LAUREN: What are you doing tonight?

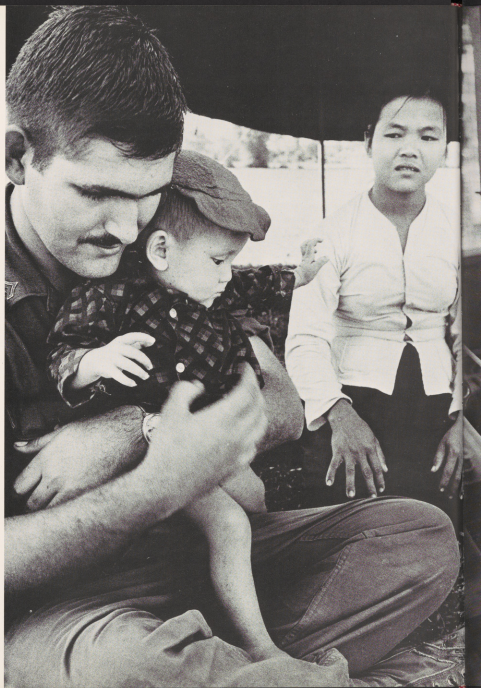

Joint Treaty of Peace

Between

The People of the United States, South Vietnam and North Vietnam

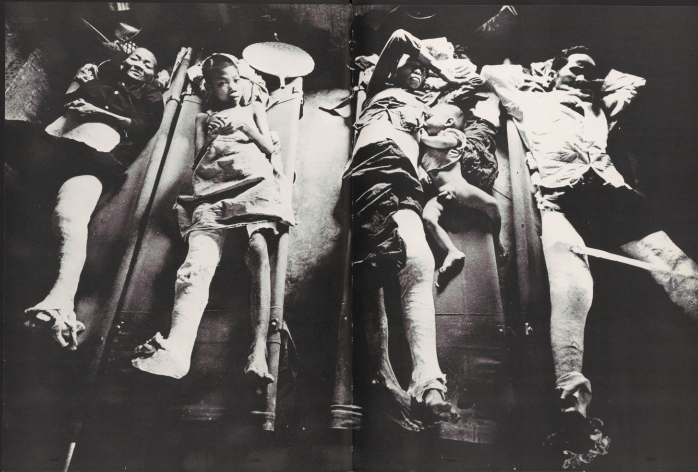
Be it known that the American and Vietnamese people are not enemies. The war is carried out in the names of the people of the United States and South Vietnam but without our consent. It destroys the land and people of Vietnam. It drains America of its resources, its youth and its honor.

We hereby agree to end the war on the following terms, so that both peoples can live under the joy of independence and can devote themselves to building a society based on human equality and respect for the earth. In rejecting the war we also reject all forms of racism and discrimination against people based on color, class, sex, national origin and ethnic grouping which form the bases of the war policies present and past of the United States.

1. The Americans agree to immediate and total withdrawal from Vietnam, and publicly to set the date by which all U.S. military forces will be removed.
2. The Vietnamese pledge that as soon as the U.S. government publicly sets a date for total withdrawal: They will enter discussions to secure the release of all American prisoners, including pilots captured while bombing North Vietnam.
3. There will be an immediate cease-fire between U.S. forces and those led by the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam.
4. They will enter discussions on the procedures to guarantee the safety of all withdrawing troops.
5. The Americans pledge to end the imposition of Thieu-Ky-Khiem on the people of South Vietnam in order to insure their right to self-determination and so that all political prisoners can be released.
6. The Vietnamese pledge to form a provisional coalition government to organize democratic elections. All parties agree to respect the results of elections in which all South Vietnamese can participate freely without the presence of any foreign troops.
7. The South Vietnamese pledge to enter discussion of procedures to guarantee the safety and political freedom of those South Vietnamese who have collaborated with the U.S. or with the U.S. supported regime.
8. The Americans and Vietnamese agree to respect the independence, peace and neutrality of Laos and Cambodia in accord with the 1954 and 1962 Geneva conventions and not to interfere in the internal affairs of these two countries.
9. Upon these points of agreement, we pledge to end the war and resolve all other questions in the spirit of self-determination and mutual respect for the independence and political freedom of the people of Vietnam and the United States.

By ratifying this agreement, we pledge to take whatever actions are appropriate to implement the terms of this joint treaty and to insure its acceptance by the government of the United States.





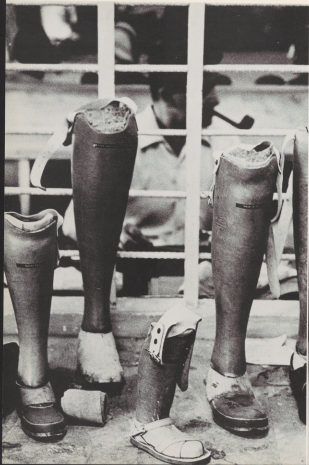
He laid in his bed, with his legs outstretched pushing against the top bunk. An open "soc" book was across his chest.

"Hell Ron, I feel bad just like you do. I know the war is wrong, and innocent people are being killed and wounded. I know all that shit, man. But I'm tellin' ya, demonstrations, violent tactics and all this talk about "planned revolution" ain't gonna change nothing. Ya gotta wait, man, wait until middle-America learns that the war is wrong . . . for everybody, including them. The people have to be educated and that includes the "hicks" on the farms in the mid-west . . . Don't worry, man, the people who rule now will one day die off and we'll take control just by using the old democratic process . . . the same way they do now."

"But it'll take so much time!"

"I know, I know. But that's the way it's gotta be done man. That's the only way."









Amidst all the rhetoric about "saving Vietnam from the Communists" one fact is always conveniently forgotten, and that is that Vietnam once had a Communist government. Furthermore, the people chose it — on January 6, 1946, during the first election ever allowed to the Vietnamese. While it can be observed, correctly, that they thought themselves to be voting for leaders more nationalist than Communist, no one has ever tried to deny that the voters were fully aware Ho Chi Minh was also a Communist. . . .

... When they are confronted with this evidence of the elected Communist government of 1946 as proof of the hollowness of the GVN's claims to wide popular support, their reaction is sheer disbelief, and in rebuttal they offer the familiar fact of the exodus from Communist North Vietnam to South Vietnam after the Geneva Accords in 1954. Now this sounds convincing until one discovers that most of those who left were followers of a foreign faith, Catholicism; and they had a bad record of collaboration with the French, which alienated them from the nationalists who had just gained power. With the promise of an easier life in the south under the newly installed Catholic Prime Minister Diem, it can be assumed that all Catholics in the north would have wanted to go south; but, despite the pressure to do so from the Church and American Psychological Warfare experts, whose contribution was to drop leaflets saying Virgin Mary had gone south and all faithful should follow, only about two thirds of them, seven hundred and fifty thousand, actually did. (Like all statistics in Vietnam, this one too has been exaggerated — President Nixon still talks about the one and one-half million Catholics who fled south.) The U.S. Government, having put Diem in power, was naturally anxious to provide him with some supporters; so, units of the Seventh Fleet were engaged to ship them south and almost one hundred million dollars was provided to cover moving expenses. . . .

RICE is the staple diet. But it is more than food to the Vietnamese — it is their purpose for existing. A symbiosis exists between the society's religious beliefs (its moral values) and its task of growing rice. To a Vietnamese, each meal has some of the significance that eating Communion bread has for a Catholic. Nowadays, American rice has to be sent to Vietnam to feed those driven from the land. The people hate it; they try to sell it for pig food to get money to buy what Vietnamese food is available. (It is, of course perfectly wholesome — but so is canned dog food, which no American would eat however many vitamins it contained.) . . .

Every time an American criticized a Vietnamese, the criticism was based on a self-righteous sense of natural superiority derived from unquestioning belief in an American monopoly of all higher morality. A belief that prompted President Johnson, in his inaugural address, to say: "The American covenant called on us to help show the way for the liberation of man. That is still our goal. . . . If American lives must end, and American treasure be spilled, in countries we barely know, that is the price that change has demanded of conviction." . . .

"They have defoliants that have produced thousands of deformed babies born in Vietnam."

And where do you think they store these defoliants before they send them over? All over the country. In our back yards.

They have nerve gas that paralyzes and kills.

And where do you think they test it? In the air over our back yards. 6,400 sheep in Dugway, Utah, didn't die of heart attacks and that half-million dollar check the Pentagon wrote to pay for the loss to the ranchers, again was **your** money. You bought the stuff that killed the sheep — and then you paid for the dead sheep — and when lamb prices go up you'll pay for that, too. . . .

And gas warfare — but, why am I telling you in the Bay Area about that? Your sons and daughters got it first hand at Berkeley when the National Guard tested some gas weapons for riot control which had been used in Vietnam. We bought that gas with our taxes, and they're using it on our sons and daughters — so our children are paying for it, too, with lung damage. . . .

... while millions of children go to bed hungry every night, our scientists are working on better biological weapons to destroy crops. Our cities are burning, and we're devoting our national resources to napalm for the straw huts of Indochina. . . .

Alcoa: \$5,590,000 for rocket motor tubes — they carry fragmentation bombs.

General Electric: "Progress is our most important product" — \$5,959,000 for research and development of the Mark-12 re-entry vehicle for MIRV. Contracts on this item alone are expected to total \$40 million.

Whirlpool Corp.: \$5.1 million for behavior projectiles. Of course we know they also make Kenmore and Goldspot appliances.

Bulova Watch Co.: \$2.6 million: metal parts for fuses for high explosives.

Borg-Warner: \$15,586,000 — bomb bodies.
Honeywell: \$286 million for cluster bombs, rockets, white phosphorous, anti-personnel mines, and other anti-people weapons.

Motorola: \$1.9 million — fuses for 40-millimeter shells.

Hamilton Watch Co.: \$9.1 million — mechanical time fuses for artillery shells.

General Motors: \$1.15 million — electronic assemblies for Mx-48 torpedoes.

Westinghouse: \$16.9 million for Poseiden launcher and handling equipment. I wouldn't be surprised if they carried on the steel belly. "You can be sure if it's Westinghouse."

P.O.W.'s

...almost all of Hanoi's prisoners are highly-paid (\$20,000 a year and more) Navy and Air Force officers who were shot down or crashed while on attack missions over North Vietnam....

Nor do they remind you of the prisoners held by Saigon under the close supervision of American advisors. No one knows exactly how many of these prisoners are being held because the Saigon government doesn't keep records.... Not all of these people are technically prisoners of war; an overwhelming number are civilians who were arrested for supposed political crimes....

The United States doesn't keep any prisoners of war itself, but turns them over to the Thieu government (which is a perfectly legal arrangement by the Geneva accords). That way it is not so hard to avoid accusations of torture, brutality, and illegal arrest that should by right be shared by the U.S. and South Vietnamese governments. And it makes it much easier for Washington officials to heap such accusations on the North Vietnamese from a position of seeming innocence....

Nixon has found a goldmine in the POW issue. He can and does use it as an excuse for almost anything — even to justify massive new bombing raids over North Vietnam....

The Pentagon itself does not produce much propaganda on Hanoi's "inhumane" treatment of prisoners. In fact they would be hard put to come up with any real evidence. The North Vietnamese have an international reputation for taking good care of POWs, whom they consider "pirates in the air, human beings on the ground."....

Only once in the summer of 1966 did it seem that Hanoi was going to take any action against the prisoners. POWs were paraded through the streets of the city, and it was announced that they were going to be tried as war criminals — which Hanoi still maintains they are. (As perpetrators of indiscriminate aerial bombardment, they certainly qualify by most international standards....)

President Ho Chi Minh said, "The main criminals are not the American pilots captured in North Vietnam, but the persons who sent them there — Johnson, Rusk, McNamara — these are the ones who should be brought to trial...."

Sometimes, the North Vietnamese government takes a POW to the area he bombed — in case he didn't happen to land there — to see what he had done. For many of the pilots it is the first time the connection is made — what they do in the air, and what happens on the ground. Sometimes, the Vietnamese report, it takes effect....

The Vietnamese have a realistic approach towards the conversion of these men, whose commitment to the war is undoubtedly pretty strong. (Otherwise why would the

Pentagon trust them to fly off with millions of dollars worth of equipment?)

The pilots have years of anti-communist propaganda behind them which isn't undone overnight. The Vietnamese are aware that they are tough to convince so they don't waste much time trying.

In any case, a returned POW who was too grateful and too anti-war would either not be believed or not allowed to talk much. So far, Hanoi has released nine prisoners, and into the custody of representatives of the anti-war movement. Except in the case of Friseman, the press has virtually ignored them....

Hanoi lists fewer than 350 POWs held in North Vietnam. The Pentagon lists 1600 as "missing in action/prisoner of war." But among the missing are many men who could not possibly be alive....

So long as the State Department pads the list of U.S. captives, it can be flaunted in the faces of the North Vietnamese negotiators in Paris, with demands that they report on 1250 men they've never seen. The insinuation of course is that they are all held prisoner and that Hanoi is keeping silent just to torture their families.

returned POWs can't be used as political footballs. They are worth much more to Nixon where they are. In part for the same reason, Washington spokesmen tend to avoid demanding the actual release of POWs (legally, Hanoi is under no obligation to return them). They talk instead in somewhat more realistic terms of releasing more accurate lists, allowing inspections of camps by the Red Cross and extending the mail privileges....

Nixon has offered a prisoner exchange. But it was calculatedly unrealistic in its terms. In a press conference in December of 1970, he revealed that "Ambassador Bruce (in Paris) offered to exchange, upon the part of the United States and South Vietnam, 8200 North Vietnamese that we have prisoner for approximately 800 Americans and other allied prisoners that they have. That's a ten to one ratio, but we're willing to do that."

Later, Defense Secretary Melvin Laird talked about exchanging 36,000 North Vietnamese for 3,000 Allied prisoners....

by setting the numbers so absurdly high (North Vietnam could never come up with 800 men, much less 3,000) they make the offer impossible to accept, even if Hanoi wanted to....

North Vietnam... insist that the only way to free the prisoners is to end the war. The PRG's point proposal, which the North Vietnamese endorse, says that the discussions for the release of prisoners could begin when Nixon sets that date for total withdrawal....

Hanoi has no intention of returning almost 350 fully-trained and experienced pilots to

the United States, only to find them flying back again, or training more men to do the same thing as has happened before....

said the mother of a captured Navy pilot, "I've gone a full circle on it — the war and the situation in Southeast Asia. It seems to me that Nixon's making a big to-do about the prisoners, but feels that if he hollers enough and makes a big stink, he can get the blame off him — and blame it on Hanoi...."

So while U.S. troops are taken out of South Vietnam, the air war over the North will continue and expand. Recent reports show that the bombing of the North in 1971 was five times that of 1970. The number of POWs will continue to use them as an excuse, indeed as a reason for the escalation....

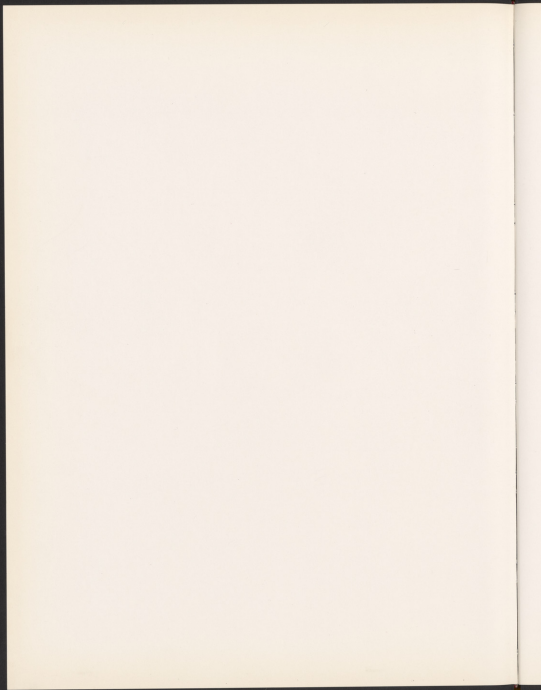
Well it's finally finished, and I must admit that I'm glad it's over. I've thanked the people who helped form the book, and now I must thank the people who helped form me.
